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Briefing on Sarawak Timber Legality Verification System Standard -Principles 5 and 6

The Sarawak Timber Development Corporation System (STLVS) Standard - Principles 5 and 6 for representatives from the downstream timber industry and timber traders in RH Hotel Sibu on 2 August 2017, ParkCity Hotel Bintulu on 3 August 2017, Pullman Hotel Miri on 4 August 2017 and finally in Riverside Majestic Hotel Kuching on 15 August 2017.

The objectives of these Briefings were to provide an overview on the requirements stipulated in the STLVS Standard particularly Principle 5 - Mill Operations and Principle 6 - Trade and Customs, as well as on the procedures in relation to the issuance of a Certificate of Compliance by STIDC.

In the welcoming remarks by Puan Dayang Nena Abang Bruce, Senior

Industry Assistant General Manager of (STIDC) STIDC, she informed participants of conducted a series of Briefings on the Briefings that the State forestry Sarawak Timber Legality Verification agencies led by the Ministry of Urban **Development and Natural Resources** (MUDNR) had enhanced and further developed the STLVS Standard which allows for a third party verification. She emphasised that the STLVS Standard was developed based on the existing State's forestry Laws and Regulations and the verification by a third party on a voluntary basis depending on market requirements. She also said that STIDC will issue a Certificate of Compliance to companies that have successfully gone through a third party audit for Principles 5 and 6 of the STLVS Standard.

Twelve Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation Experts Group on Illegal Logging and Associated Trade

(APEC) Senior Officials' Meeting (SOM 3) and Related Meetings which were held from 15 August 2017 to 30 August 2017 at Ho Chi Minh, Vietnam, the APEC Experts Group on Illegal Logging and Associated Trade (EGILAT) met and conducted the following activities from 18 to 22 August 2017:

(i) Workshop on Customs Best Practices to Identify Illegal **Timber and Wood Products**

(ii) Anti-Corruption and Transparency Working Group (ACTWG) Pathfinder Dialogue IV

(iii) 12th Experts Group on Illegal Logging and Associated Trade (EGILAT) Meeting

The Malaysian delegation comprised seven (7) representatives and was led by Mr Mad Zaidi Mohd Karli, Senior Undersecretary from Ministry of Plantation Industry and Commodities (MPIC).

Mr Nguyen Van Ha, Deputy Director General of Vietnam Administration of Forestry, Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development of the Socialist Republic of Vietnam, in his Welcoming Remarks at the Workshop on Customs Best Practices to Identify Illegal Timber and Wood Products, shared that Vietnam has stepped up on the customs force's anti-smuggling activities to prevent illegal wood trade. This effective measure is a result of its customs agencies' increased efforts in managing imported wood, collecting information on businesses with violations in wood business and classifying these firms as high risks of illegal wood trade.

Ms Jennifer Prescott, Assistant US trade representative for environment and natural resources mentioned that the trading of illegal wood products had negatively impacted

In conjunction with the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation the price of legal wood products as well as the legal and sustainable management of forests. Therefore, APEC economies which account for around 53 per cent of the world's forests, 60 per cent of global production of timber products and 80 per cent of global trade in timber products need to work together to create stricter control tools to solve the problem.

Meanwhile, presenters at the 2-days APEC Pathfinder Dialogue IV on Fighting Corruption and Illicit Trade across the Asia-Pacific Region which is initiated to meet the call by APEC Ministers and Leaders to fight the corruption that fuels and facilitates illicit trafficking harmful to APEC economies, markets, and communities shared with participants of the Dialogue on corruption as a driver of illegal logging as well as ways to combat corruption in the forest products trade in customs' environment.

The Dialogue also served as a platform for discussions on new momentums for combating corruption in wildlife trafficking, on ways to work with civil society to combat corruption as a facilitator of wildlife trafficking and sharing of success stories in addressing law enforcement integrity.

The 12th APEC Expert Group on Illegal Logging and Associated Trade (EGILAT) Meeting, attended by a total of sixteen (16) economies; namely Australia, Canada, Chile, China, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Peru, the Philippines, Russia, Chinese Taipei, United States and Viet Nam was chaired by Dr Ruth Turia.

With just three years left to 2020, most countries that have committed to reducing the loss of globally threatened species and protecting their habitats under the Convention on Biological Diversity's (CBD) 2020 biodiversity targets, have made inadequate progress in achieving the targets.

A 2016 report by CBD also state that funding for conservation is becoming increasingly scarce, thus making the need to prioritize on areas to protect and actions to undertake to halt loss of species, even more crucial.

The Meeting received and shared several updates, namely (i) Korea's revised Act on Sustainable Use of Timbers which will come into force on 21 March 2018, (ii) the 4th APEC Meeting of Ministers Responsible for Forestry will be held in Seoul, South Korea from 30 October to 1 November 2017, (iii) the Meeting had achieved most of the planned activities under its 2017 Work Plan and

the remaining activities will be captured in the 2018 Work Plan, (iii) a few economies are still developing their Timber Legality Guidance Template (TLGT) while others have not yet worked on theirs but agreed to complete the TLGTs by SOM 1 2018.

The Meeting also discussed at length on the Draft EGILAT Multi-Year Strategic Plan 2018 – 2022 and agreed for the economies to send in their comments and inputs for the consideration of EGILAT 13 at the Senior Official Meeting 1 in 2018.
